1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

August 2025 was both a challenging and transformative month for Empowered Child Ministries. We welcomed two new monthly donors, Ricardo and Eva-Maria, whose steady support strengthens our ability to provide food, education, and healthcare. Yet, this was also the month we faced the highest number of sick children, with cases of malaria, fever, and headaches requiring significant spending on medication, doctor's visits, and transport facilitation for medical care.

Despite these challenges, important progress was made. Physiotherapy sessions continued under Dr. Sylvester and Dr. Flavia, bringing steady improvements for children with disabilities, though equipment and space remain inadequate. Special needs education also moved forward, though limited by lack of classrooms and teaching tools. Spiritually, Sunday services and mid-week fellowships offered encouragement, despite disruptions from bad weather.

Staffing improved with the hiring of two new caretakers, Nakiirya Miria and Birungi Beatrice, and a cook, Nalongo Prossy, allowing for better care and efficiency. Household upgrades included purchasing a new saucepan, introducing a center scale to reduce food wastage, setting up a laundry area, refurbishing bunk beds, installing a plate rack, and adding a kitchen window for ventilation—all enhancing children's health, dignity, and daily living.

Education remained central as **49 children** returned with report cards at the end of term, and a holiday learning program was launched for Primary 4–7 pupils. Though we could not celebrate birthdays due to limited funds, we began the process of securing our own electricity connection, moving away from unsafe reliance on neighbors' power. Finally, our dance team received new African fabric outfits and eight pairs of shoes, boosting their confidence and cultural pride.

Overall, August revealed both struggles and resilience. While health needs and resource gaps were significant, each intervention—whether medical care, education, or home improvement—demonstrated our commitment to providing a safe, nurturing, and hopeful environment for 56 children under our care.



2. AUGUST 2025 UPDATES

1. New Donors

This month we welcomed two new monthly donor commitments: **Ricardo (USD 31.4)** and **Eva-Maria (USD 21.1)** through PayPal. These contributions may seem small in numbers, but they are a tremendous encouragement to our work. Every new donor represents a fresh stream of hope and stability for the children. Monthly giving is especially powerful because it provides predictable support that allows us to plan ahead, knowing that basic needs such as food, healthcare, and education will continue to be met.

Their generosity is more than financial—it is a reminder that our children are not forgotten. Each child feels valued when they learn that people across the world believe in their future. This also boosts our morale as caretakers and leaders, because it affirms that our work is seen, trusted, and supported. Ricardo and Eva-Maria have become part of the Empowered Child Ministries family, and their kindness will echo in every meal served, every book bought, and every smile restored.

2. Children's Health

August was perhaps the most challenging month in terms of children's health that we have faced this year. A wave of sickness struck, with many of our children suffering from fever, malaria, and persistent headaches. These illnesses required immediate response, and a substantial amount of resources went into purchasing medicine from pharmacies, paying for medical consultations, and facilitating transport for Dr. Elijah to attend to the children at the home.

The financial strain was heavy, but the impact was life-saving. Children who might have deteriorated into more severe conditions received timely care. Malaria in particular can be deadly if untreated, but with swift intervention, we were able to restore health and avert tragedy. Beyond just physical healing, the children experienced the reassurance of being cared for—that even in their weakest moments, they are not alone. This reinforces their sense of security and belonging, which is as important as the medicine itself.

3. Physiotherapy & Special Needs Care

Physiotherapy remained a crucial activity in August. **Dr. Sylvester** continued to visit every Thursday, working with boys like **Christopher, Sharif, Brighton, and Samson**. His sessions focused on improving mobility, strengthening muscles, and preventing physical deterioration. At the same time, **Dr. Flavia** continued working with special needs children from the community, offering guided exercises that stimulate movement and coordination.

The progress is gradual but visible. Children who once struggled with stiffness are beginning to show small but important improvements—sitting longer, stretching further, or gaining confidence in simple movements. For the parents of community children, these sessions bring hope that their children can grow with dignity. However, we remain limited by the lack of equipment and a proper therapy space. Even so, the dedication of these doctors and the consistency of therapy sessions are transforming lives step by step. Each stretch, each exercise, each smile is a victory worth celebrating.



FUKO BRIGHTON

Date of Birth: 1st April, 2018

In early June 2024, Brighton tragically lost both of his parents in a motor accident. Due to his disability, none of his relatives were willing to care for him, although his non-disabled siblings were taken in by family members. A compassionate neighbour temporarily offered him shelter while seeking a permanent solution. Through referrals, the neighbour connected with our organization, and we were able to provide Brighton with the care he needed.

Brighton suffers from cerebral palsy, which limits his mobility. However, he remains a cheerful boy who communicates, albeit not very clearly. He uses his hands to crawl around and enjoys playing with toys.

Despite his challenges, Brighton's positive attitude and joy for life are inspiring. He loves eating chicken and rice, finding comfort in his favorite foods. With support and care, Brighton now has the opportunity to thrive and build a brighter future.

4. Special Needs Education

The special needs education program continued but faced significant challenges. Without a proper classroom or enough specialized equipment, it has been difficult to run lessons effectively. Teachers and caretakers are doing their best with the little they have, improvising tools and spaces so that learning continues in some form.

Despite these challenges, the effort itself carries great meaning. Special needs education ensures that no child is written off, no matter their limitations. The children are learning basic communication, social interaction, and essential life skills that will help them integrate better in society. This program embodies our core value—that every child matters. Yet, we are deeply aware that without better facilities and tools, the children's potential remains underdeveloped. August showed us both the progress we are capable of making and the urgent need for more investment in this area.

5. Spiritual Growth

Worship remained a central part of life in August. **Sunday services** and **Wednesday night fellowships** continued to nurture the children's spiritual growth and community bond. Though some Sundays were disrupted by heavy rains, the moments we gathered together were filled with songs, prayers, and teachings that grounded the children in faith and hope.

The impact of these gatherings cannot be underestimated. Many of our children come from backgrounds of neglect, abandonment, or trauma. Spiritual fellowship gives them a sense of family and belonging that they may not have experienced before. They are learning not only Bible stories but also values such as love, forgiveness, resilience, and kindness. In a world that has often denied them affirmation, these spiritual sessions whisper truth into their hearts: "You are loved. You belong. You have a purpose."

6. New Caretakers & Cook

In late July, we faced the challenge of letting go of two caretakers. This left a serious gap in child care, which was felt deeply by both children and staff. In August, we filled this gap by hiring **two new caretakers, Nakiirya Miria and Birungi Beatrice**. Their arrival brought renewed energy and stability, ensuring that the children once again received personalized attention, emotional support, and day-to-day guidance.

Additionally, we welcomed a new cook, **Nalongo Prossy**, whose role has already made a big impact. By taking over kitchen responsibilities, she allows caretakers to focus fully on the children's welfare instead of splitting time between cooking and caregiving. This simple change has increased efficiency, improved meal preparation, and enhanced the overall quality of care. It reflects our philosophy that every staff member should be empowered to do what they do best for the children's benefit.

7. Household Improvements


• **Kitchen & Cooking:** With most saucepans broken, cooking had become a challenge. In August, we managed to purchase one new saucepan, though the need for more remains urgent. We also invested in a **center scale** to measure food quantities precisely. This has already reduced waste, improved accountability, and ensured fair distribution of meals for the children.

- Laundry Space: We set up a dedicated laundry area where children can wash and hang their clothes. This has improved hygiene, reduced clutter, and given children a structured routine that teaches responsibility for their belongings. Clean clothes and order in daily living also restore dignity to the children.
- Bunk Beds: Many of our bunk beds had broken pipes, making sleep uncomfortable and unsafe.
 We refurbished these beds in August, giving children the gift of safe and restful nights. A strong bed is more than furniture—it is a foundation of health and emotional security. One of our children from the bed (3rd deck) and got fractured. He is now better.
- Plate Rack: The installation of a new welded plate rack has kept utensils clean and organized.
 This small upgrade has improved hygiene standards and reduced breakages, making meal times smoother and healthier.
- **Kitchen Ventilation:** We added another window in the kitchen to reduce smoke and darkness. This has greatly improved the cooking environment, protecting staff and children from smokerelated discomfort and creating a brighter, healthier space for meal preparation.

8. Education

Education remained a priority in August. On **August 20th**, the second term ended and 34 children returned home with report cards. Some of them struggled with performance due to the transition into new schools and different teaching environments. However, after engaging with school heads, we are confident that the children will adapt and improve in the next term.

Meanwhile, children in **Primary 4–7** began a **holiday learning program on August 25th**, designed to keep their minds engaged and prepare them for the third term starting September 15th. This extra effort reflects our belief that education is the surest path to empowerment. Even when challenges arise, we remain proactive in keeping learning alive so that our children's future remains bright.



9. Birthdays

Sadly, in August we could not celebrate children's birthdays due to lack of funds for cakes and gifts. These celebrations may seem small, but for our children, they mean the world. A birthday party is often the only time in their lives they feel singled out for joy and celebration. The absence of this tradition this month was deeply felt, and we pray that in future months we can restore this vital source of affirmation and happiness.

10. Electricity

For years, we have depended on our neighbour's electricity, which has not only been unsafe but also illegal. In August, we took the bold step of beginning the process of acquiring **our own official power connection**. This marks a milestone in our journey toward independence, safety, and dignity. With our own power, we will be able to provide consistent lighting, safe cooking, and a secure environment for the children—especially during nights and study sessions.

11. Dance & Talent Development

August ended on a bright note for our talented dance team. The children received **new African fabric outfits** and **eight pairs of shoes**. The joy and excitement this brought cannot be overstated. Not only do the children look stunning in their new attire, but their confidence has soared. When they perform, they now feel dignified, proud, and united as a team.

Dance is more than just performance—it is therapy, cultural pride, and self-expression. For children who have faced hardship, dancing in beautiful outfits reminds them of their worth and beauty. It opens doors to new opportunities, while also keeping them active and disciplined. August showed us once again that investing in talent development brings joy, resilience, and hope.

3. FINANCIAL REPORTS

The financial report of Empowered Child Ministries demonstrates accountable and transparent use of resources, highlighting budget allocations, expenditures, and funding sources. Primary income came from individual donations, partner grants, and fundraising efforts, sustaining the **56 children under our care.**

Spending focused on child welfare—ensuring food, clothing, and shelter—while education programs provided learning materials and specialized support for both school-going and disabled children. Healthcare expenses covered medical treatments, emergency care, and therapies for those with special needs.

Operational costs such as administration, utilities, and facility maintenance were carefully managed, supporting smooth daily operations. This included upkeep of the children's home, caretaker allowances, and vital services like electricity and water.

3.1 Collected Donations

During this reporting period, Empowered Child Ministries received a total of **UGX 26,550,280**, equivalent to **USD 7,585.79** and **GBP 5,900.06**. These generous contributions directly impacted children's lives by enabling access to education, healthcare, shelter, nutrition, and spiritual development.

3.2 Expenditure

In July 2025, **direct expenses totalled UGX 26,670,413 (USD 7,620.12/ GBP 5,926.76)**. These covered administration, operations, program costs, and utilities—ensuring children receive food, education, health care, and a safe environment. Every shilling directly strengthens the impact of Empowered Child Ministries' mission to nurture and transform young lives.

In August 2025, administrative expenses totaled **UGX 4,006,286 (USD 1,144.65 / GBP 890.29)**, covering caretaker allowances, internet, website upkeep, and transaction fees. These essential supports ensure smooth operations, secure donations, and consistent care—forming the backbone that enables Empowered Child Ministries to transform the lives of 56 children under our care.

4. FUNDING NEEDS

Empowered Child Ministries (ECM) continues to be a place of hope, safety, and dignity for vulnerable children. However, our mission now faces urgent challenges that threaten our ability to sustain the holistic care—spiritual, emotional, and physical—that the children depend on.

One of our most urgent needs is **reliable power**. Frequent outages leave children in darkness, disrupting evening studies and endangering safety. **Installing solar panels** will ensure sustainable energy and uninterrupted learning.

We face critical infrastructure challenges. Our office remains incomplete, drainage and compound works are unfinished, and painting is still required. Most urgently, we must expand space. Currently, 30 children share one room, while authorities require no more than 10. Without compliance, we risk closure. Purchasing additional land and constructing a storey building would reduce congestion, improve safety, and secure long-term stability for the home.

The health and wellbeing of our children require consistent medical check-ups, urgent treatments, and physiotherapy. Gaps in care threaten their progress and quality of life.

We are also committed to skills development through projects like liquid soap-making, which build confidence and create future income opportunities.

To improve transparency and communication, we need a **DSLR camera** to document children's progress and share their stories with supporters.

Children with disabilities need specialized education tools such as sensory toys, tablets, block letters, and picture cards, while nutrition support requires a deep freezer for safe food storage, a blender for soft diets, and mosquito nets to protect against malaria.

Finally, with numbers rising, we urgently need more caregivers, teachers, and therapists, alongside structured caretaker training to reduce mistakes and improve care quality.

Your support will help us secure power, expand facilities, improve healthcare, strengthen nutrition, and empower staff—giving every child the chance to grow in safety, dignity, and hope.

Additional Priorities (No Fixed Cost Yet)

Healthcare & Therapies: Children require routine check-ups, urgent treatments, and ongoing physiotherapy to maintain progress and quality of life.

Skills Development: Projects like liquid soap-making build confidence, teach practical skills, and open pathways to future income.

Special Needs Education: Adaptive tools—sensory toys, tablets, block letters, and picture cards—are essential for inclusive, effective learning.

Nutrition Support: A blender is needed to prepare fresh juices and soft diets for children with special needs, complementing daily balanced meals.

Human Resources: More caregivers, teachers, and therapists are required to ensure personalized attention and consistent care.

Caretaker Training: Structured training will reduce mistakes by new staff and lift overall care quality across the home.

5. CHALLENGES

August 2025 was a month filled with significant challenges at Empowered Child Ministries. While many positive strides were made, several pressing issues emerged that highlighted the urgent need for better systems, resources, and protections for the children under our care.

1. Loss of Property and Theft Concerns

During August, we experienced troubling losses of small but essential property items including bicycle accessories, a grass-carpet, and even children's shoes. These repeated disappearances were deeply concerning and caused unnecessary stress on already limited resources. The alleged involvement of our security guard, Fred, in these losses has raised serious questions about trust and safety within the home. Such theft not only drains resources but also compromises the sense of security the children need. This incident has highlighted the urgent need for reliable security measures, including dismissal of untrustworthy personnel and the installation of CCTV cameras for accountability and monitoring.

2. Frequent Sickness Among Children

August also marked one of the worst months in terms of children's health. Many fell sick with malaria, fevers, and strong headaches, forcing us to spend heavily on medical care, transportation for doctors, and medications from pharmacies. While we are grateful for the services of Dr. Elijah, the recurring nature of these illnesses points to deeper structural issues. The lack of mosquito nets leaves children vulnerable to malaria, while stagnant water around the home provides breeding grounds for mosquitoes. These preventable conditions are not only costly but dangerous to children's lives and futures.

3. Limited Facilities for Special Needs Programs

Our physiotherapy and special needs education programs continued but remain heavily constrained. Sessions with Dr. Sylvester and Dr. Flavia are yielding progress, but we still lack essential equipment and an adequate space where children can safely carry out these exercises. Similarly, special needs education is being delivered by Teacher Sarah, but without a proper classroom or specialized learning materials, the impact is limited. These gaps threaten to slow down the developmental progress of the children who need the most support.

4. Household and Kitchen Challenges

Basic household challenges also continued in August. Most of our saucepans were spoiled, forcing us to purchase only one new one despite needing more. Poor food measurement practices led to wastage, prompting us to invest in a center scale to control portions better. In addition, the kitchen remained smoky and dark, making cooking unsafe and uncomfortable until a new window was added for ventilation. While these steps improved conditions, the recurring wear and tear of household items requires a more sustainable approach.

5. Staffing Gaps and Risks of Mistreatment

After dismissing two caretakers in July for child mistreatment, we faced a gap in caregiving which was only addressed after hiring two new caretakers in August. Though this improved care, the incident highlighted the dangers of child abuse and the importance of close supervision. Staff misconduct is a serious threat to the mission of providing a safe, loving environment.

6. Lack of Funds for Child Celebrations and Extras

August also saw the painful reality of uncelebrated birthdays due to lack of funds. These moments, though seemingly small, are crucial in giving children a sense of love, identity, and belonging. The inability to provide cakes or gifts left some children disappointed, underscoring the need for a dedicated fund for child celebrations.

6. RECOMMENDATION

Security Improvements – Immediately terminate untrustworthy staff like the current security guard and replace with vetted, reliable personnel. Install CCTV cameras to monitor movements within the home and deter theft.

Health & Sanitation Measures – Urgently acquire mosquito nets for all children to reduce malaria cases. Improve drainage systems around the home to eliminate stagnant water. Establish a routine spraying program to keep mosquito breeding low.

Special Needs Infrastructure – Build or partition a dedicated space for physiotherapy and special needs education. Partner with organizations or donors to acquire essential physiotherapy and educational equipment.

Household Management – Develop a replacement plan for spoilt kitchen items such as saucepans, and establish a preventive maintenance system for household tools and furniture. Continue using the center scale to reduce food wastage and improve budgeting.

Staff Training & Child Protection – Invest in continuous training for caretakers on child rights, discipline, and trauma-informed care. Develop a strict monitoring system to prevent mistreatment, and provide support to staff to avoid burnout.

Child Celebrations Fund – Set up a small but dedicated fund for children's birthdays and celebrations. Even modest celebrations with cake and shared meals can make a powerful emotional impact on children's well-being.

Sustainable Partnerships – Seek more monthly donors and local partnerships to create a predictable income stream that can cover recurring costs like health, nutrition, security, and child care needs.
